

How are the cables routed inside the cable tray



Article Overview

Cables inside a cable tray are routed along planned pathways, grouped by type, separated to prevent interference, and supported to maintain integrity and accessibility.

Cable Routing Principles

Cables are routed in trays following a predefined layout that considers the building structure, cable type, and electrical requirements. The primary goal is to create a straightforward, efficient path that minimizes unnecessary bends and junctions, reducing stress on cables and facilitating maintenance or future upgrades .

Grouping and Separation

Cables are typically grouped by function: power, control, and instrumentation cables are separated to prevent electromagnetic interference (EMI). In industrial settings, power cables are often placed above instrumentation or signal cables, and a minimum vertical and horizontal spacing—commonly around 300 mm (12 inches)—is maintained . Where space is limited, metal dividers or partitions can be used to maintain separation and reduce interference.
